



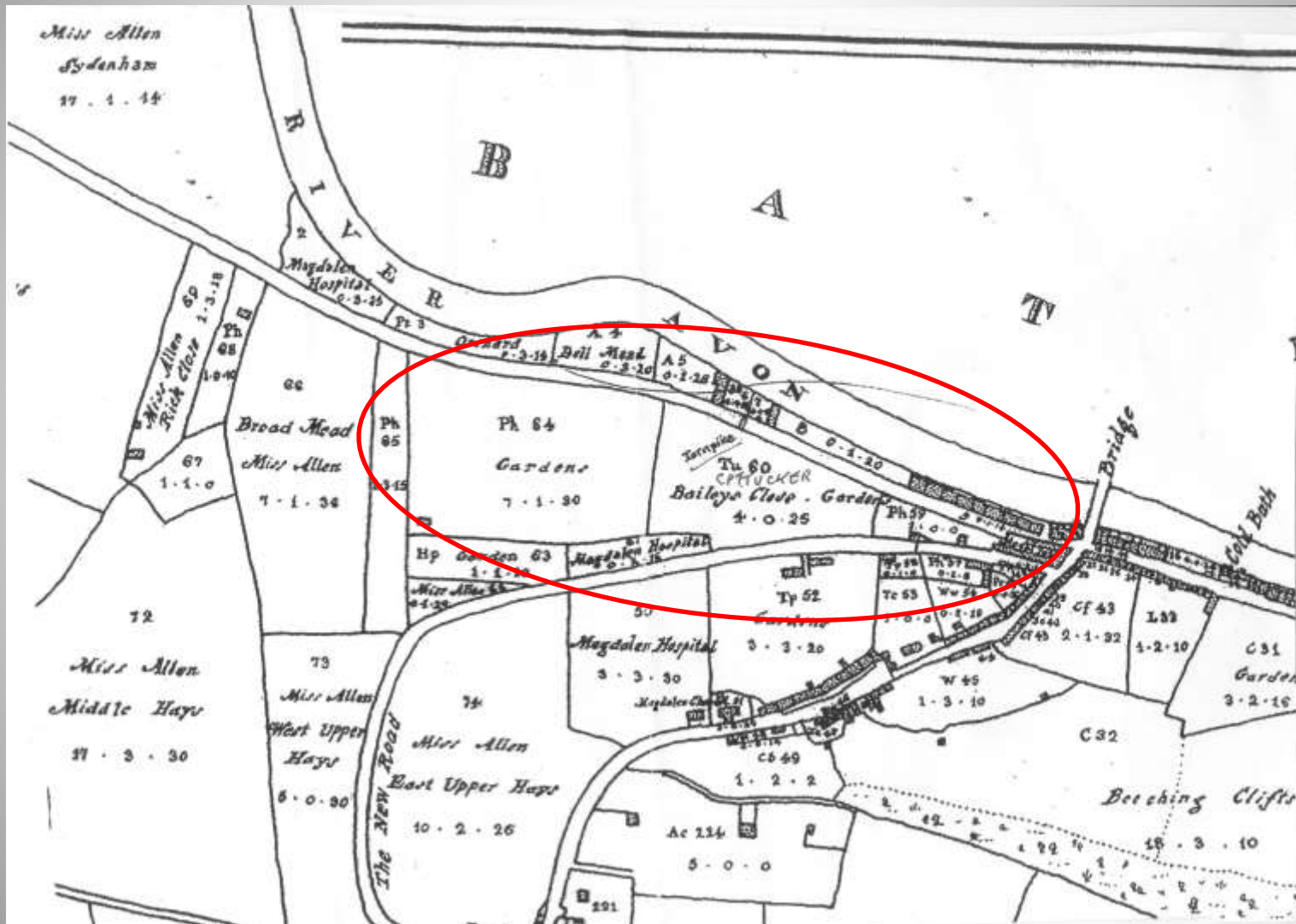

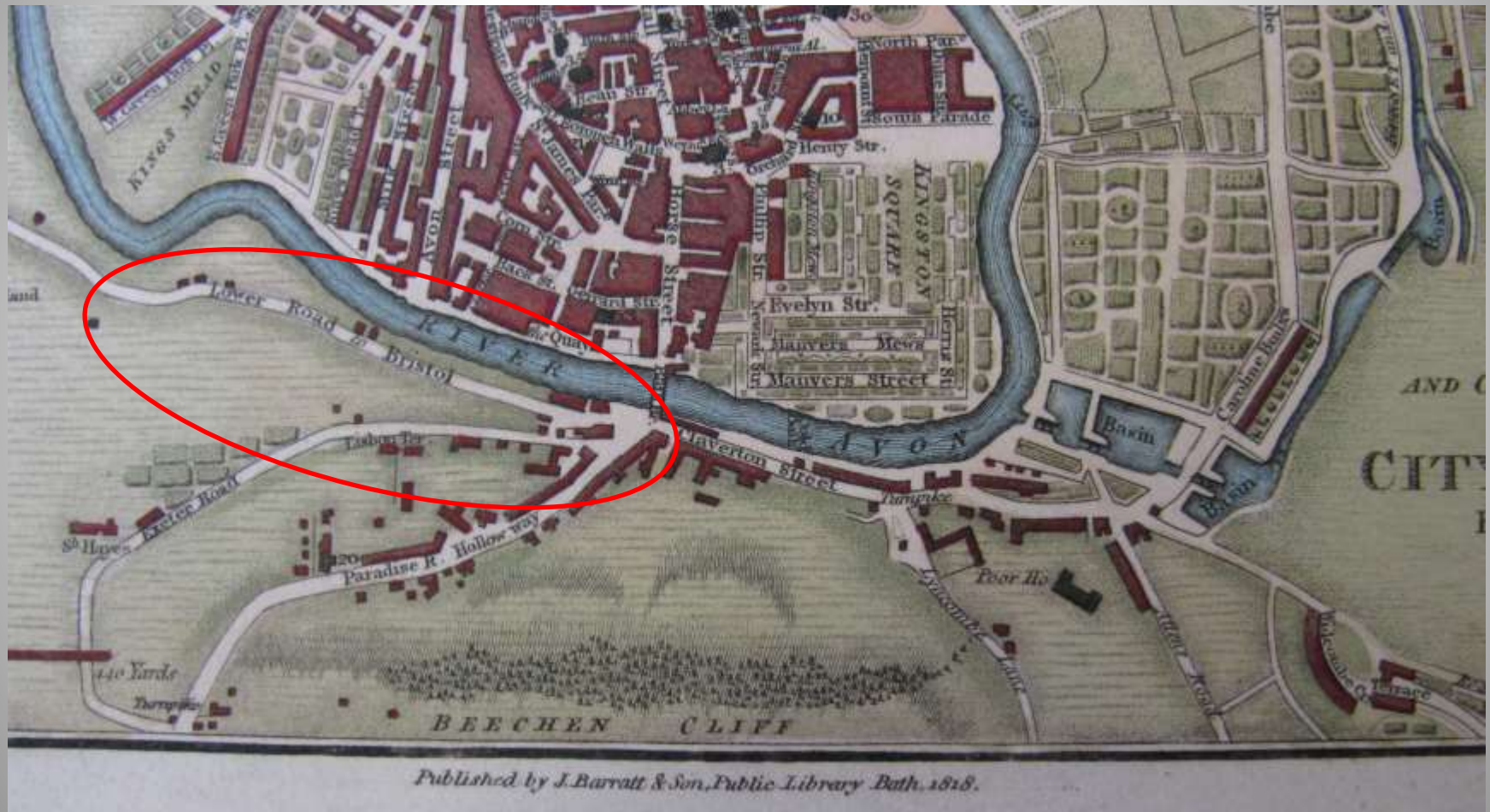
Charlton Map 1799

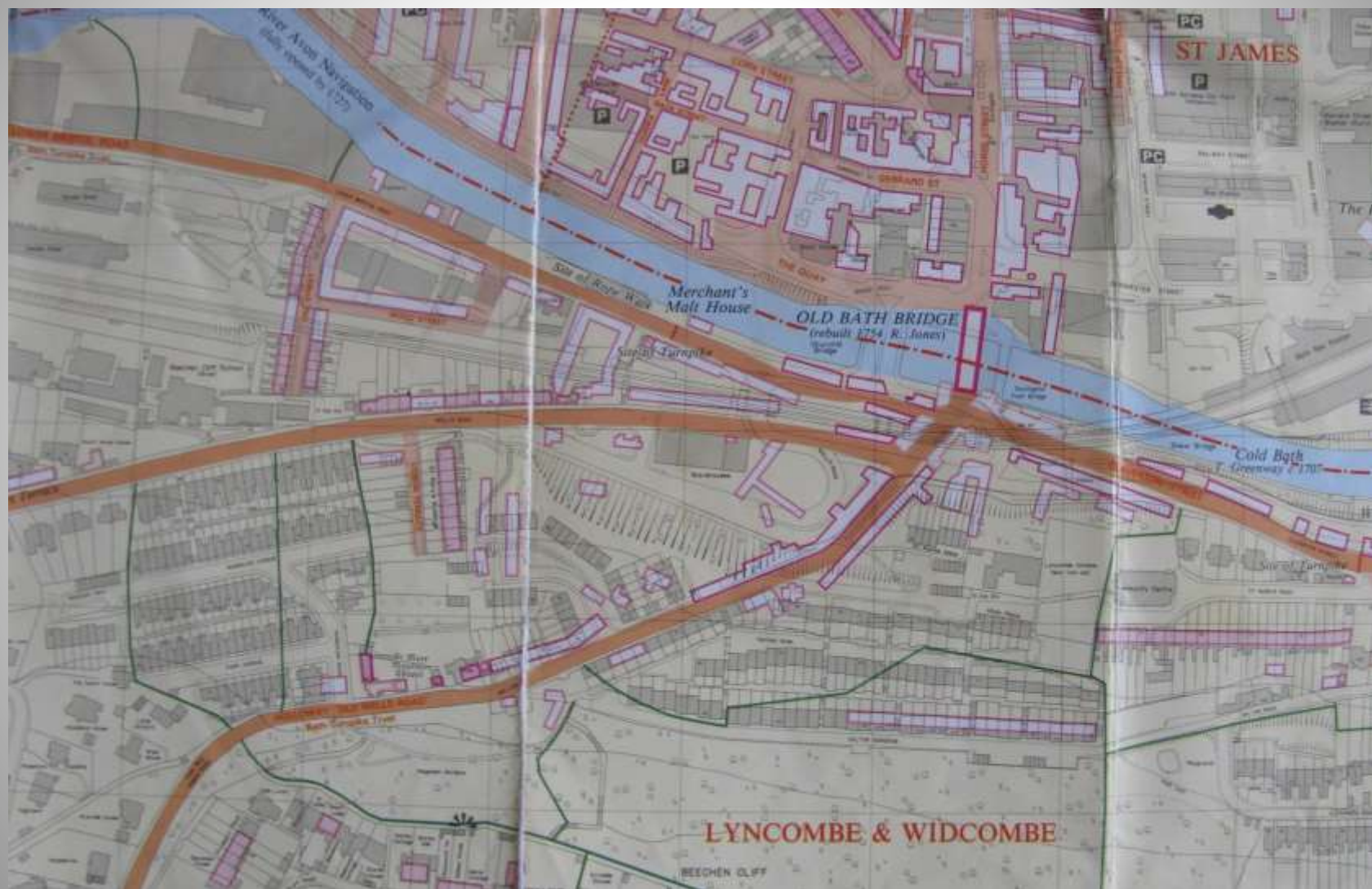


Map of 1800

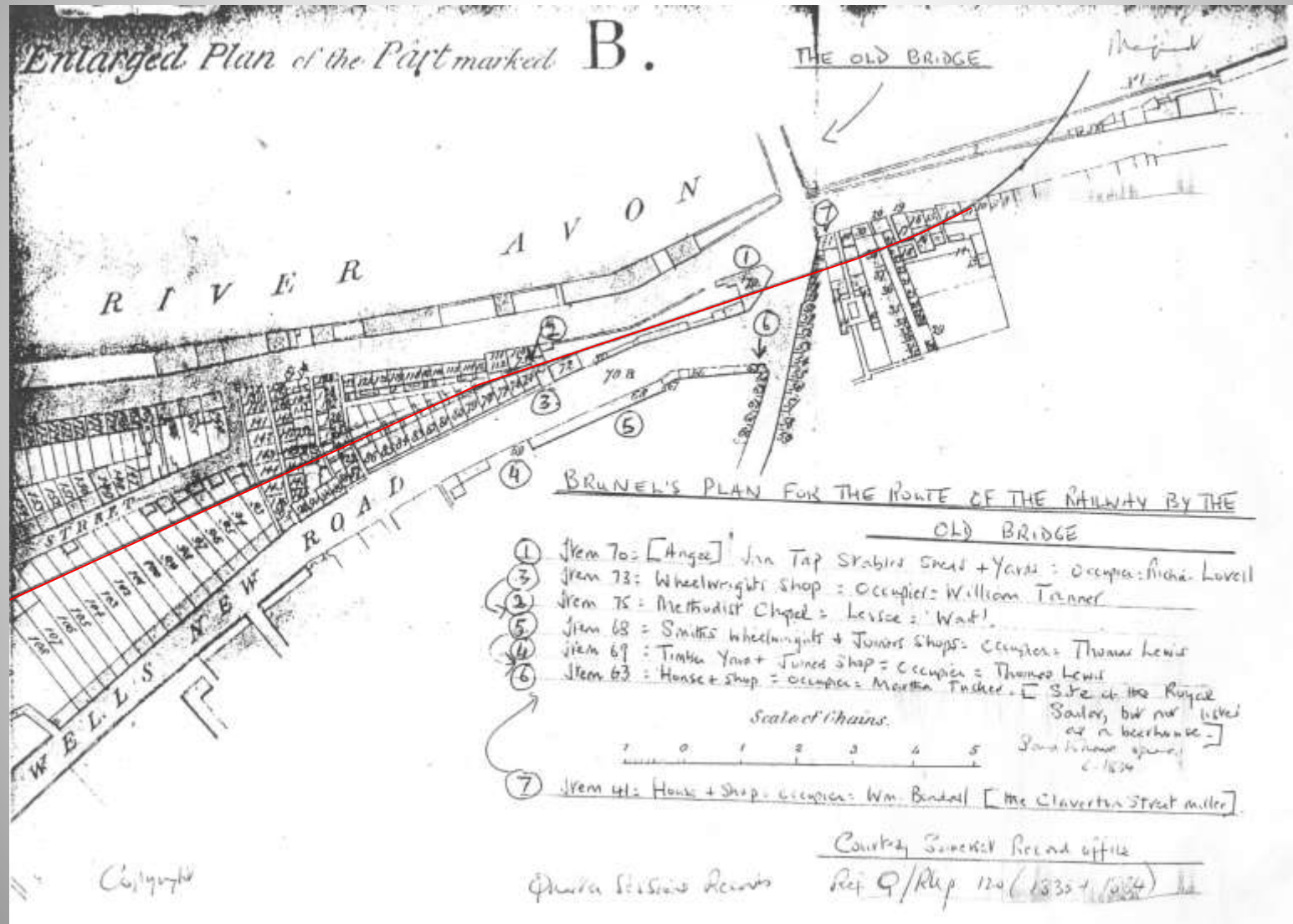


J Barratt Map of 1818

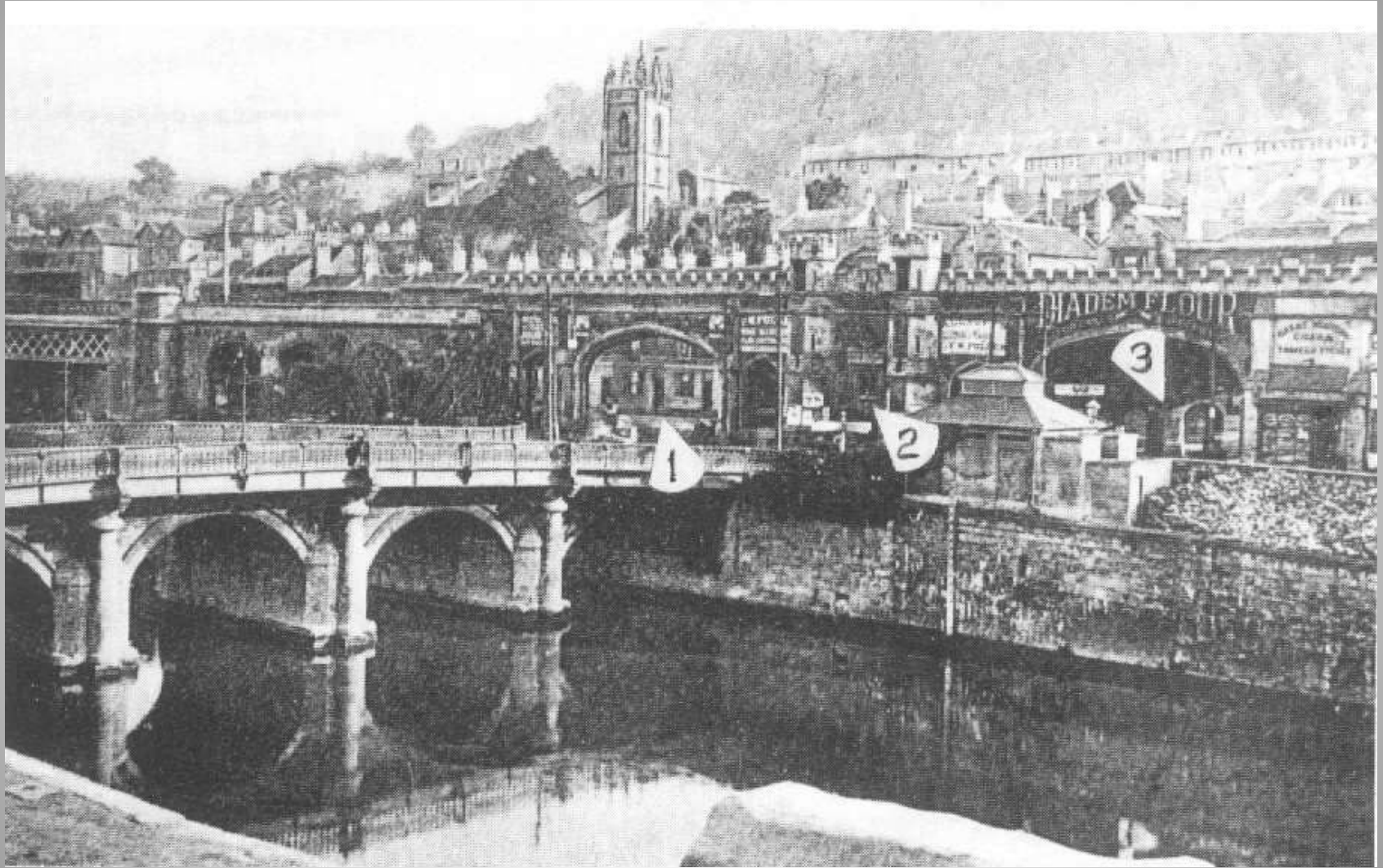

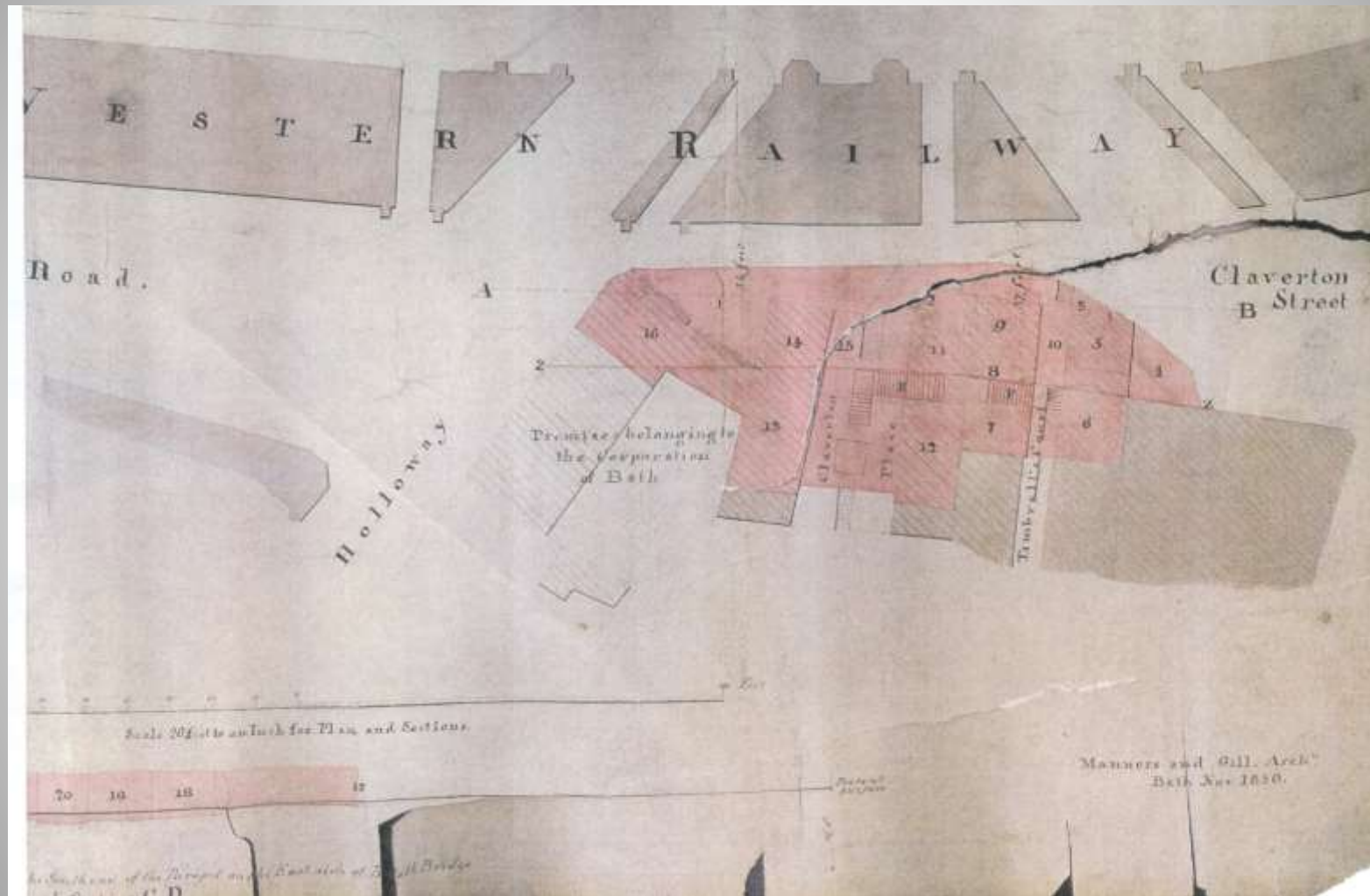

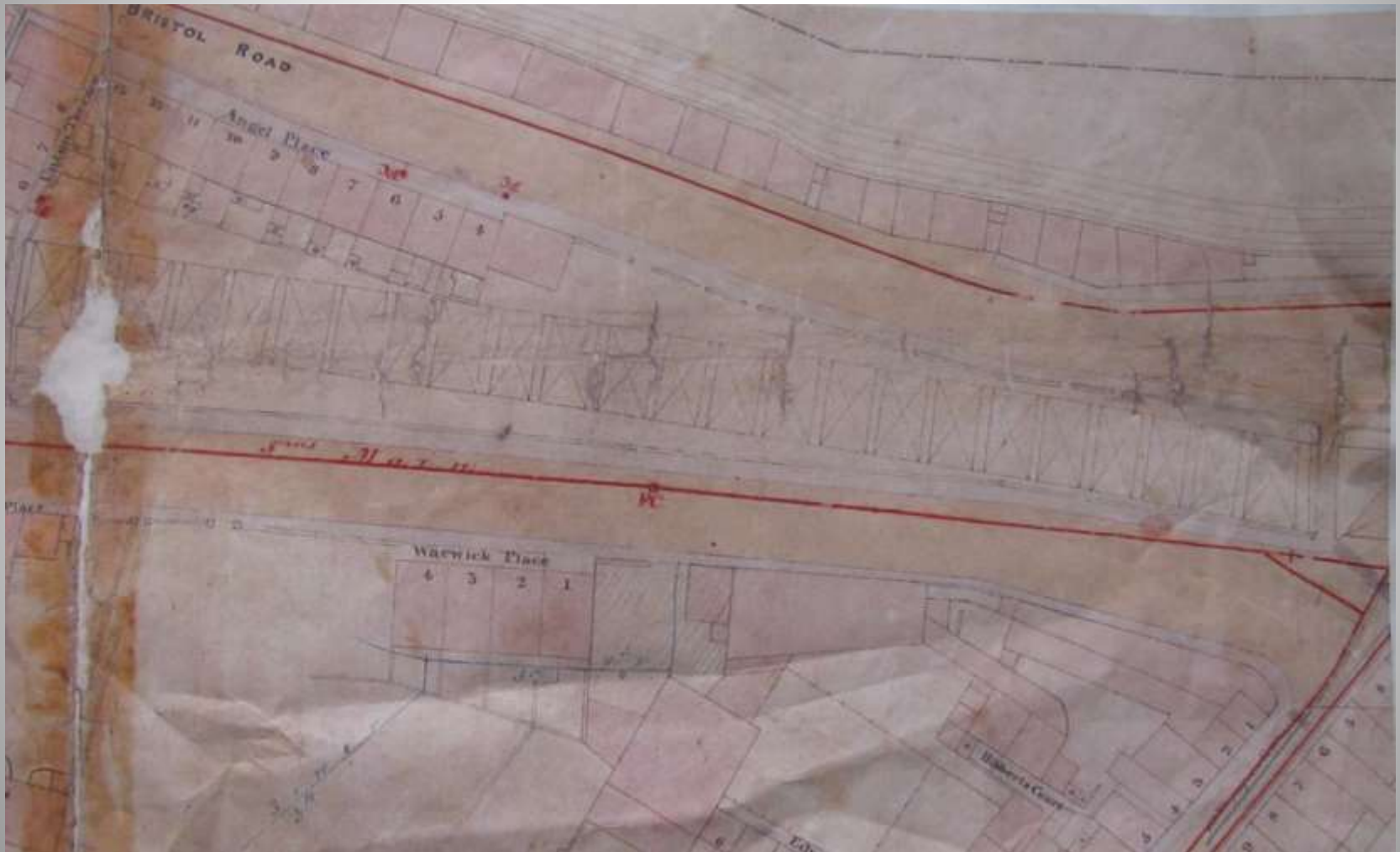

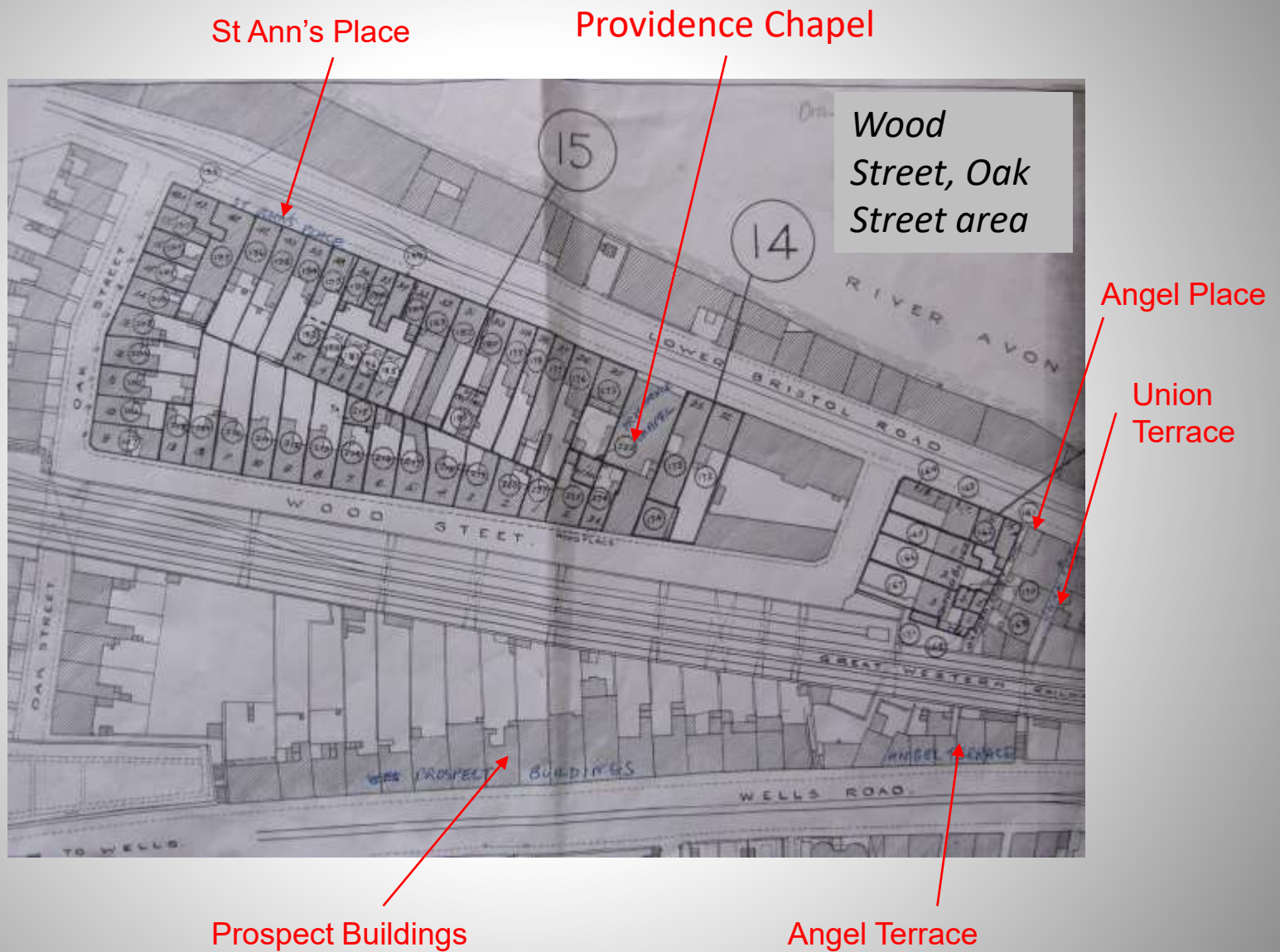

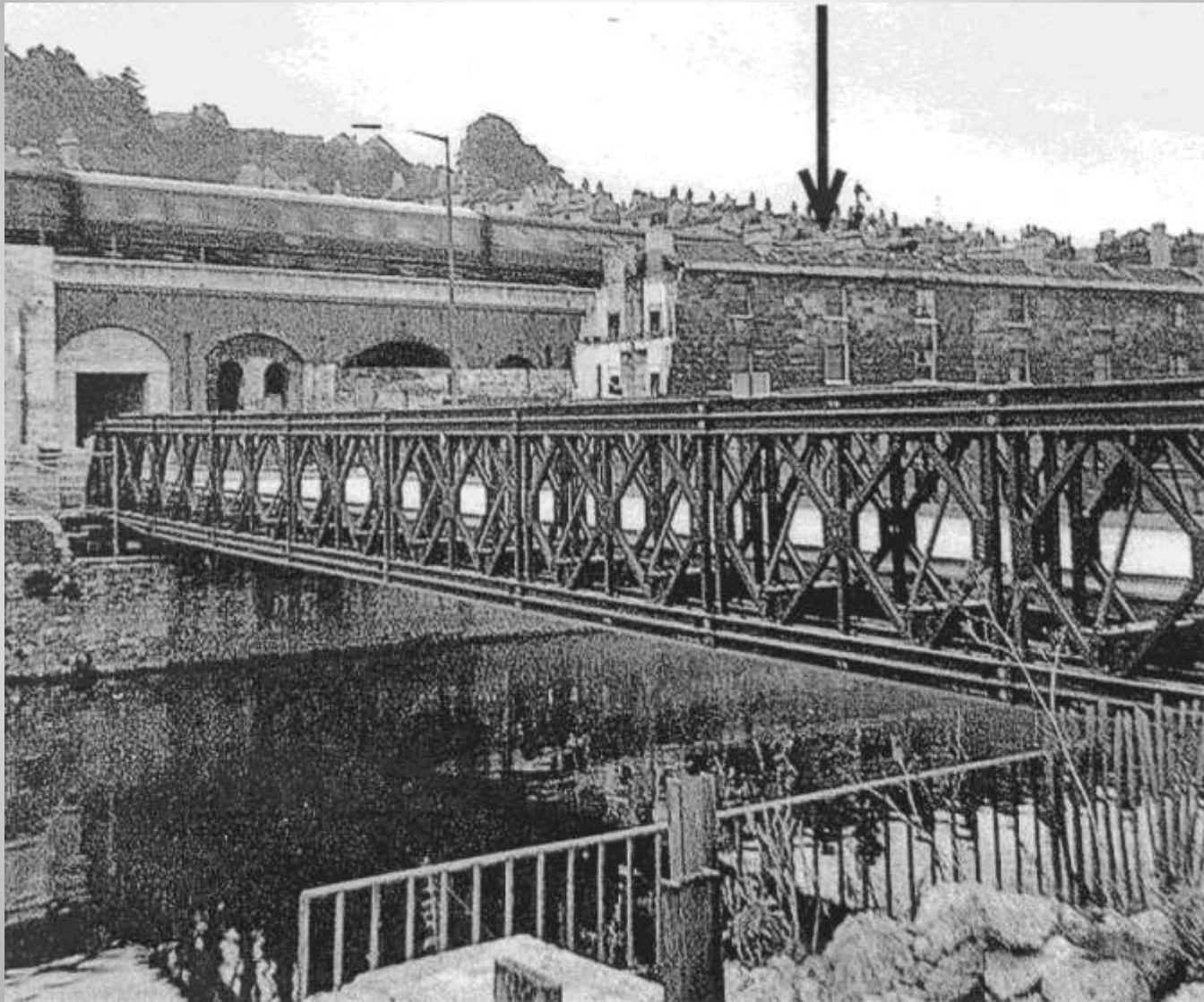

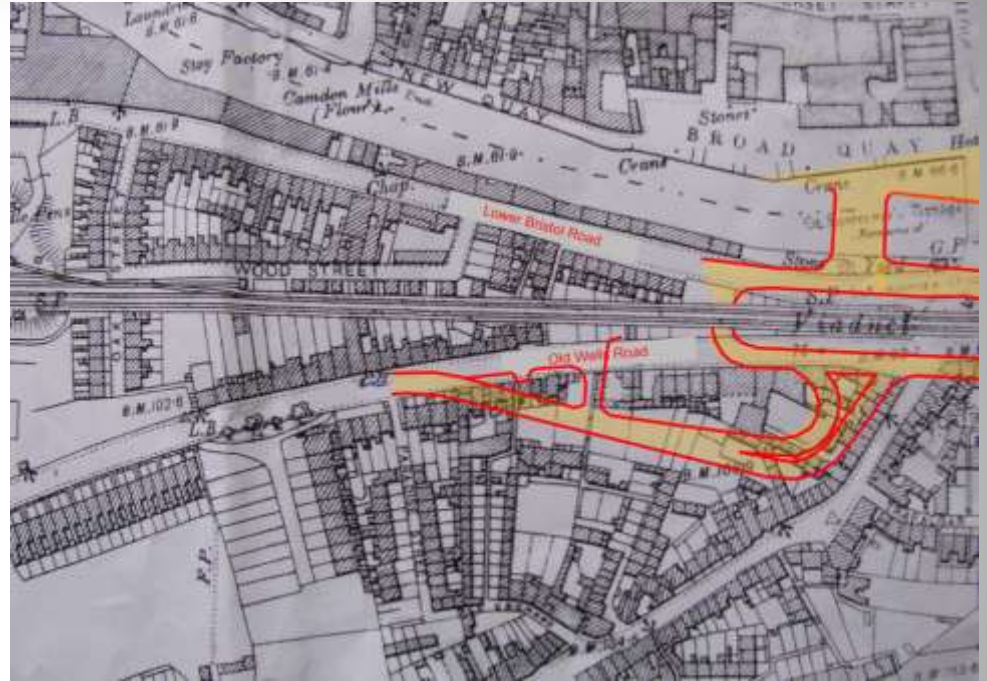

The Railway:

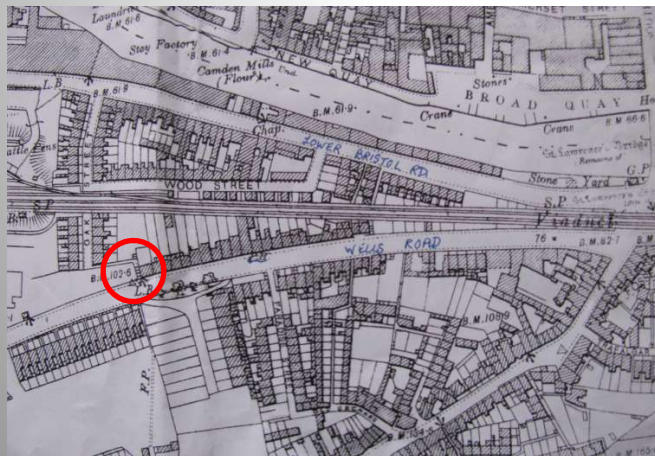
- built in 1836

- converted to flats



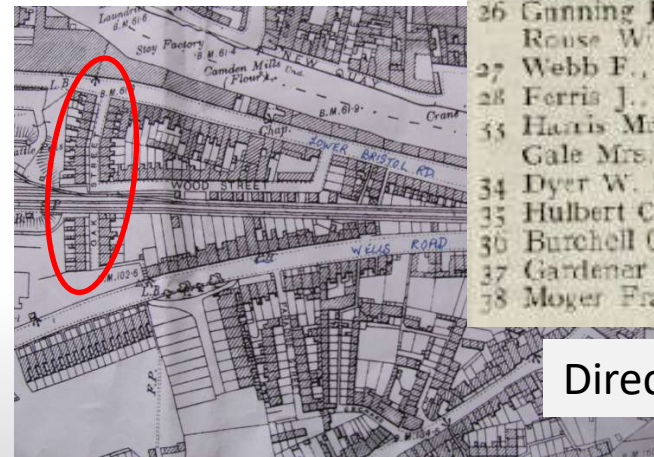
